Each night in Australia, over 116,461* fellow Aussies are homeless. Some are sleeping on mate's couches, in their cars or a Boading House, whilst others cram into a room with 15 other people or look for a dry, safe place to sleep on the streets.

In the Yarra Ranges, it is estimated that we have over 400 friends, relatives, neighbours, co-workers or fellow students who are experieincing the trauma of homelessness each day.

OUR COVID-19 RESPONSE

It is difficult to believe that this is the second year in which the world has been combating the Covid-19 panademic.

Holy Fools continued to take the safety of our volunteers and friends very seriously, adhereing to the many safety conditions that were required. That meant supplying facemasks to everyone, face shields if required, and copious amounts of hand santiser.

We continued to provide Street Angels even during the most strictest lockdowns, with food deliveries and take-away only food supplied at Melba Park. The issue of food security is a growing concern, as is the mental health of the community.















STREET ANGELS OUTREACH

Despite the various lockdowns and other measures, Street Angels continued to supply nutritious food, community contact and material aid throughout the year. However, for the first time in over six years since Street Angels began, we had to stop lunch in the park and move to a delivery model during the heaviest restrictions in Melbourne in 2020.

The outreach fluctuated from normal with chairs, coffee and sit-down lunch with clothes and other material aid offered; to no chairs, and coffee with takeaway meals only, masks and social distancing required; to packaging individuals and family meals to deliver to known folk thought the region, including those sleeping rough and those in caravan parks etc.

One constant was the need for not only food but human contact. In fact, during the heaviest restrictions, we would be the only people some of our friends would see for the whole week.

Our friends deserve recognition for their resilience, as well as being patient and understanding as the situation changed, sometimes week to week. Many are doing it tough, and the lockdowns and isolation are severely impacting mental health. We continue to be a point of constant contact that our friends rely on for not only food but human contact. Street Angels would not have been possible without our amazing volunteers, who have stepped up to make our outreach possible each week. Their resilience and creativity have meant that each week has been that little less difficult to organise. We would like to recognise **Deborah Hamilton, Rachel Ryan, Lynette Grant, Alice Anastasio**, and **Timothy Courtman** for volunteering throughout the year. A special thanks to **Meaghan, Rachel, Mandy, Sue** and **Kathy** for the delicious lunches they prepared throughout the year.

We have had some businesses, organisations and individuals who have also prepared food for Street Angels. This has included **Mike Basset** and the team from **Cold Stream Brewery** for their lunches and ongoing support, **Amanda McKeown** and the team from **Australian Quality Condiments** for their lunch and support, **Josh Martin**, **Vaughn Malekhai Williams** and all the men from the **Victorian Brotherhood** for the bbq and talking with our male friends; and lastly thank you to **Julie-Ann Morman** and the team from **Tasty Az** for preparing and serving lunch. Without these supporters and the community, Street Angels could not have the impact that it continues to have within the homeless and at-risk community.

CHRISTMAS HAMPERS

With the issue of food security in mind with the lockdowns for COVID in Melbourne, Holy Fools decided to aim for 200 Christmas Hampers, a 40% increase on last year's effort. We weren't sure how we could do it, knowing that in the past when we started to pack the hampers inevitably, there were shortages of some items, necessitating several trips to the supermarket.

We put the call out for donations in late October, realising that several of our collection points were actually closed and that the office and the ARC would really be the only places the community could donate. Immediately we started to see donations come in.

Then we started getting calls from organisations saying they had run a collection for us!

So, the day we packed the hampers and realised that we had reached over 200 hampers, we almost thought there was a mistake in counting. There was still so much food and drink leftover that it filled several tables and the space under them! It was the first time we had a surplus of food!





















Thank you to everyone who donated food, lollies, drinks and toys to the hampers! Some so many people contributed that it is difficult to name them all but some special callouts to JP Haddad and The Brick Store community for both donating and helping pack; Donna from Global Confectionery, who also donated and helped pack; Sujayne Smith Downie and the Yarra Ranges Council's Business Development Team; the Rotary Club of Croydon and Montrose; Bayswater North Primary School; and the staff and parents of Manchester Road Early Learning Centre.

Of course, the hampers would be nothing without the amazing team of volunteers who gathered to pack them! Special thanks to **Deborah Hamilton**, **Deb Mcleod**, **Rachel Ryan**, **Jennifer Taylor**, **Oscar Taylor**, **Tim Heenan**, **Caoilainn Taylor** and the many others who packed and stacked.

All the hampers were distributed to our guests at our Christmas Lunch, others in the community that we helped, and several organisations and charities that we partner with, including **Southern Cross Kids' Camps Australia, Elisha Care** and the **Philanthropic Collective**, amongst others.

CHRISTMAS LUNCH

We knew that Christmas Lunch 2020 would have to be different from previous years. With the restrictions and precautions for Covid in place and changing month to month, week to week and sometimes day today, it was difficult to start to plan for a Christmas Lunch. Speaking to other people and organisations that ran a Christmas Lunch, we came up with several ideas that we shared, and with the resources available to us, decided on one course of action. In contrast, some of the other groups did a variation.

Our plan was to make the lunch outside on Christmas Eve. Outside as we could safely have people congregate and seating social distancing wasn't an issue; and Christmas Eve due to the availability of resources and volunteers, the awareness of public transport etc.

So, the plan was put into action on Christmas Eve as things started to arrive, and the set-up began until the space was ready! Folk started to arrive, and after signing in, they were offered drinks and lollies and encouraged to social distance safely. Pretty soon, lunch was served, and our 100 or so guests enjoyed hamburgers and sausages with various salads. Later, ice creams helped cool everyone down, and as folk were leaving with full bellies and happy hearts, they were given a hamper! Thank you to all our sponsors and supporters, including the Rotary Club of Lilydale, for cooking all the supplied meat from John at The Meat Inn Place, with the BBQ fired up by supplied gas from Yarra Valley Gas. The cold room was supplied by Ranges TEC and delivered and set up by Glenn Booth. George and some amazing Tongan helpers set up the Kilsyth Township Group's Stretch Marquee, while chairs and tables were supplied by Betta Event Hire. Big Event Picnic Tables supplied several of their tables.

Cr Tim Heenan was on hand to help move hampers and setup. Special thanks to the **Yarra Ranges Council** for their help with the location. Thanks to the **Mustard Tree Op Shop** for their support and the **Coldstream Brewery** for suppling several salads.

However, the day would not have been possible without the team of volunteers that helped set up, keep the place clean (thanks, **Neil**), keep everyone safe and serve the food! It was finally announced that students in essential service placements were allowed to start, and we had the honour and privilege of hosting Alice Anastasio and Cecilia Paras. Both are Box Hill TAFE students, with Alice studying a Diploma of Community Service while Cecilia was studying a Cert IV in Mental Health.

Both students were hard workers and keen to learn, not only at the office but on the field with our friends on the street. Besides their school workload, we set them a few tasks that they worked on together. The first was a flyer for children about poverty and homelessness to partner with the adult one we have produced. The students researched and gathered ideas before drafting some concepts before the final design was chosen.

Students are a valuable part of the fabric of Holy Fools, and we value their contribution and efforts.

FINANCIAL STATEMENT

The Board has determined that the association is not a reporting entity and certifies that the Financial report submitted presents a true and fair view of the financial position of Holy Fools Inc, as at 30 June 2021 and its performance for the year ended on that date. At the date of this statement, there are reasonable grounds to believe that Holy Fools Inc. will be able to pay its debts as and when they fall due.

This abbreviated 2020/2021 Financial Year report reflects the financial statements that will have been lodged with the ACNC. To see our full financials please refer to their website.

This has been an odd year for our accounts. On one hand we have seen an increase in grants and a downturn in donations. Likewise, many outreach expenses have been curtailed in other expenses due to how we have had to adapt to operate this year for restrictions.

In addition we have started to depreciate items such as the van and other equipment and write off some of the items that have been stolen or lost over the past few years. This has resulted in a loss for this year. We hope to turn this around in coming years and increase our fundraising efforts as well as donations and regular giving.
